Technology

Technology is used to enhance student learning from Kindergarten to Year 6. The suitable use of technology offers students an engaging and practical learning environment. All students and their families complete a Student User Agreement at the start of each year which outlines the appropriate use of technology across the grades.

Learner Diversity

Children with specific learning needs are well catered for at St Martin's, as are children in need of enrichment or extension learning. Learner Diversity teachers work alongside classroom teachers to ensure that all children at our school are the best learners that they can be.

Collaborative Coaching

Teams of teachers join together with the Assistant Principal to learn more about each student with the aim of improving student outcomes with an emphasis on Mathematics and English. This promotes every student's success by setting achievable goals individually.



Parents and Friends Association

The Parents and Friends Association (P&F) recognises and values the role that parents and carers play in the education of their children and aims to strengthen the partnership between family, school, parish, and the wider community. We cannot underestimate the importance and the benefit for children when parents are engaged with their child's learning.



Before and After School Care

St Martin's has on-site Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) run by Catholic Care. The service is open from 7am-8.30am each morning and 3.15pm-6pm each afternoon. School holiday programs are also available for interested St Martin's families. The service is also open for bookings on Pupil Free Days.

The Enrolment Process



The Enrolment Process for Catholic Schools Broken Bay has been designed to ensure the best possible outcome for your child. The process aims to provide opportunities where the importance of the parent/school partnership is established before your child comes to school. Through open and transparent discussion, we are committed to working together to ensure a quality Catholic education for your child.

The completed Enrolment Application form, together with the requested supporting documentation, should be submitted to the school as early as possible. Enrolling families will be invited to attend an interview with the principal prior to placement offers being made.

Following a formal letter of offer and an acceptance by the family, your child will be invited to attend several school visits throughout the year before they start school.

Relationships with High Schools

Catholic Schools Broken Bay believe a Catholic education is for life and offers a diverse range of educational opportunities from Kindergarten to Year 12.

Every student who is enrolled in a CSBB primary school will be supported to continue their Year 7 to Year 12 education within the CSBB system.

Our primary schools work together with local secondary schools to provide a seamless transition and a sense of continuity in our students' learning journey.
